Area conservation clubs demonstrate unprecedented synergy when dealing with the Greater City of Sudbury Councilors on initially proposed Firearm Discharge By-Law Changes

Firearm discharge bylaw changes were proposed so that the entire Greater City of Sudbury boundary area would fall under a single set of common guidelines.

The initially proposed bylaw changes did not create any distinctions between the firing range of center fire guns, shotguns and bows & arrows. Area conservation clubs had asked to be consulted in this area when the city underwent its initial amalgamation. The issue hadn't been addressed until recently.

Many active club members from our area conservation clubs contacted each other and bombarded our area councilors with calls and Emails. The councilors responded quickly and promised to take a step back, giving us an opportunity to provide some public input. Gerry Haarmeyer, of the Trailsmen Rod & Gun Club, attended the Feb. 9th Sudbury Priorities Committee Meeting and reported the following:

Subject: Proposed Sudbury Firearm Bylaw

Attended Sudbury's Priorities Committee Meeting Last night (Feb.9,2005) where a staff report for public involvement for a firearm discharge bylaw was tabled. As you know there were four options proposed with the fourth option being the preferred option. Council debated around option #1 and #4 and some councillors were even questioning the need for a bylaw, Others wondered why they were tampering with an issue that wasn't a problem. A statement was made that the police nor staff should be telling the councilors what the bylaw should be and that it should be the public. There was some debate about the chair and Co-chair of the committee being the appointed council members. An amendment was proposed to

option #4 that the chair and Co-chair be elected by the committee itself and that was adopted. Then council voted to accept option #4 to create a task force to address the firearm discharge issues. The task force will consist of two councilors, five appointed members of the public, four of whom have to be firearm knowledgeable, one has to be a farmer and one a rep of zone D of the Federation of Anglers and Hunters and its affiliated clubs. These seven people will be voting members and will elect a chair among themselves. The councilors appointed to the committee were councilors Dupuis and Bradley. There will also be three resource people on the committee; an MNR representative, a police representative and a member of the bylaw department, they will be non voting members. This group is expected to be put together over the next few weeks to start their work.

I was approached by councilor Dupuis after the meeting to be a member of the committee. I stated that I would participate if appointed. Apparently there will be a public application process to express interest to sit on this committee. Successful applicants will then be appointed. Public meetings are proposed for each ward once work commences for this committee.

Were keeping abreast of the discharge bylaw, once we know who will be on the committee we will set up a meeting with the clubs to map out our own needs and strategy.

General Meeting

MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING HELD ON JANUARY 19, 2005

Present: 15 members and two guests, Eldon Hawton (FoF) and Gerry Haarmeyer (OFAH), were present.

1. Esko called the meeting to order at 7:15 PM, followed by the pledge.

2. The minutes from the Executive meeting on January 5th were reviewed. Gerry Haarmeyer noted that the proposed restriction on wolf hunting on Manitoulin were *not* law yet, as reported in the minutes. Pressure on the MNR can still be made through the local MPP, Mike Brown, to not go ahead with province-wide restrictions that include Manitoulin Island. Mike Brown can be contacted at 705-461-9710 and by fax at 705-461-9720.

3. John Honse noted that public consultation by the MNR appears to have little influence on the MNR's final decisions. For example, with regards to the proposed changes to Moose allocation tags (more tags for northern residents), 425 comments were received of which 27 were in favour and 331 were against. Despite the overwhelmingly negative public response, the changes went ahead anyway.

4. Esko briefly reviewed the Whitefish Lake First Nation's plans to acquire land.

5. A motion to accept the minutes from January 5th, with the above noted correction regarding wolf hunting, was made by Dick Stewart and seconded by Dick Perras. The motion carried unanimously.

6. John Honse noted that membership renewals have been low so far.

7. Treasurer's report: Dick Stewart reviewed the club's finances. Motion to accept the Treasurer's report was made by Dick and seconded by John Celestini. Carried unanimously.

8. Gerry Haarmeyer reported on the City of Sudbury's draft firearms discharge bylaw, due to go

before Council on January 27th. The draft bylaw is intended to replace the numerous bylaws in effect before amalgamation of the city of greater Sudbury. There has been no public consultation on the proposed bylaw. The draft contains the phrase; "no person shall discharge a firearm *or a bow* within 1.6 km of a dwelling". Exceptions are made for a course of archery instruction, nuisance animals, and certified shooting ranges. This bylaw would remove a lot of hunting opportunities, including waterfowl, from local areas currently enjoyed by bow and shotgun hunters. Gerry suggested an immediate campaign to get in touch with local city councillors via phone and/or email to request public input into the bylaw. Dick Stewart noted that there may be an antihunting agenda at work here as well.

9. John Honse reported that at least 10 children will be going to the OFAH Youth Get Outdoors conference. There are 7-8 activities planned per year. \$125 has been set aside for a youth pizza party.

10. Bert Legault noted that Laurentian University held a walleye study seminar on January 11th. There will be a walleye seminar at the OFAH conference.

11. Big and Small Game: John Honse reported that the Moose Watch program had resulted in 660 charges being laid.

12. Esko has the OFAH lottery tickets, and will be collecting the sold books and money to send to the OFAH. We could not get into the South Ridge Mall on the dates previously reported. Revised dates: January 31 to February 13, and February 28 to March 14. Dick Stewart requested help on Wednesdays.

13. Bert Legault discussed plans for the annual Fish Pond. Help has been offered by the Trailsmen. A form in the next newsletter will be provided for volunteers. Everything appears to be under control.

14. New items:

- Bursaries for Laurentian University students: 1 \$500 and 2 \$250 bursaries. Presentations will be made at the February general meeting.

- The SGAF internal draw for items received from the OFAH (crossbow, fish finder, etc.) will have no restrictions – the more events and meetings you attend, the more often your name is added to the hat.

- Mike Mallory will be taking over somewhat from Al Roy on Crests and Clothing. Mike will try to put together a SGAF catalogue.

- A certificate was awarded to SGAF from the Trailsmen at the Zone D meeting in recognition of SGAF's walleye stocking efforts.

- There are new keys for the club properties' gates. Turn in your old key and receive a shiny new one.

- The army cadets were scheduled to use the club property last October, but cancelled due to bad weather. They want to use the property this weekend.

15. Authorization to transport forms for restricted firearms are available from Stan Miller.

16. The business part of the meeting was followed by a presentation by Eldon Hawton from Friends of Fur (FoF). Eldon discussed FoF's efforts to have black bears reintroduced to southern Ontario, and the rationale for the campaign. There will be a fund-raiser for FoF in Coniston – details to follow. Esko awarded Eldon a cheque for \$200 towards FoF's fund-raising efforts, and thanked Eldon for a very interesting presentation.

17. The meeting concluded at 9:05 PM.

January guest speaker follow up: Friends-of-Fur gets some media attention on their bear reintroduction proposal

This N.O.S.A. press release details some of the media attention their cause is getting.

Subject: Natural Resources Minister Turns Down Black Bear Reintroduction

It was not surprising that Natural Resources Minister David Ramsay turned down a proposal last week by the Northwestern Ontario Sportsmen's Alliance (NOSA) to have trapped nuisance black bears from northern Ontario relocated to parts of southern Ontario where there currently are few or no bears whatsoever. What is surprising are the reasons

given by the Minister and at least one southern Ontario University biologist for refusing such a plan.

In a taped radio interview response to the proposal, aired late last week on the CBC, Ramsay replied to NOSA's proposal by pointing out that such a plan would not likely work because southern Ontario is basically one "large clearcut" as he phrased it, therefore there would be insufficient habitat availability for the bears. He acknowledged that by moving the bears south he would be allowing the **bear problems from the north to be repeated in the southern part of the province.**

A University Professor from Guelph, Dr. Thomas Vernon, also provided similar comment to the plan by suggesting that a reintroduction of black bears is a bad idea that would cause problems for people and bears alike in southern Ontario. He cites a lack of suitable habitat as the primary reason that black bear reintroduction **would lead to bears roaming into southern Ontario urban centers inevitably sentencing them to death as a result of them being shot by authorities.**

This leaves NOSA and many northern residents asking the question therefore, if these scenarios are unacceptable for southern Ontario **then why are they being allowed to continue in the north.** Keep in mind that science played no part in the cancellation of the spring bear hunt, rather moral and ethical questions were raised as to the acceptability of a spring season.

NOSA and northern residents welcome the scientific facts to be included in a province wide Black Bear management plan. A recent Manitoba study titled "*Using reproductive data to model American black bear cub orphaning in Manitoba due to spring harvest of females.*" (2003) supports spring bear hunting and points to evidence which proves that a spring bear hunting season reduces the likelihood of nuisance encounters even in years of poor berry conditions, by keeping the bear population at a manageable level. Evidently, this study and others like it have been ignored by the Provincial Government ever since the cancellation of the spring bear hunt in 1999. But now that Black Bear reintroduction is being proposed for southern Ontario and biologic concerns are being raised, is it fair to ask, "are science and biology going to be factors that influence the

government's black bear management program for the entire province or just southern Ontario?"

This is a valid question and it would suggest that if indeed this is the case then perhaps the Ontario Government would listen to the science and biology which supports a spring bear hunting season in northern Ontario as a means of effectively managing the black bear population thus mitigating public safety and liability concerns relating to dangerous and destructive nuisance bear behavior affecting northern residents. Or is there a double standard in Ontario? Can certain groups and government in the south use science and biology as a matter of convenience to manage their wildlife, while proclaiming that northern bear management must be based on the whims of moral and ethical zealots from southern Ontario. It can't be both ways.

Habitat is not endless in the north, and neither is food for the bears, and without effectively limiting their population growth with a spring hunt as the Manitoba study suggests, then how can Northerners continue to be expected to learn to "live with the bears" especially now that the Ontario Government has said that southern Ontario residents will not be subjected to a similar fate?

The Minister has said "NO" to black bear reintroduction but in the meantime he has not offered a reasonable cost effective solution to Northern Ontario's nuisance bear trouble. NOSA is asking the Minister to publicly answer to these concerns.

1. Call to order: Esko called the meeting to order at 7:15 PM.
2. Esko noted a number of items for which there was some general discussion:
 - \$1,000 in academic bursaries have been awarded to Laurentian University students. There will be presentations at the February General meeting.
 - The Sudbury Army Cadet Wolf Squadron spent one night winter camping on the club property. Their leader, Gerald Lavoisier will be given an honorary membership in the club.
